

Testicular Cancer Awareness Month

Testicular cancer is a disease in which malignant cancer cells form in the tissues of one or both testicles. Testicular cancer is the most common cancer in men aged 15 to 35 years old, with an average age of diagnosis being 33 years old. It is a highly treatable cancer especially if caught and treated early. With early detection, treatments are more effective and often less aggressive than when the cancer is detected in the later stages. Treatment options include surgery, radiation therapy, and/or chemotherapy and depend on the type and stage of the cancer.²

TESTICULAR CANCER CAN OCCUR AT ANY AGE:4

- Testicular cancer is the most common cancer in men 20 to 35 years old.
- Approximately 6% of cases occur in children and teens.
- An estimated 8% of cases are diagnosed in men 56 or older.

RISK FACTORS AND AWARENESS:

Self-exams, starting in the adolescent years, are key in early detection of testicular cancer.³ Health history can affect the risk of testicular cancer. Tests that examine the testicles and blood are used to detect and diagnose testicular cancer. It is important to note that treatment for testicular cancer can cause infertility.¹

While there is no way to prevent testicular cancer³, you should talk with your doctor if you think you may be at risk. Risk factors for testicular cancer include:¹

- Having had an undescended testicle
- Having had abnormal development of the testicles
- Having a personal or family history of testicular cancer (especially in a father or brother)



UNFORTUNATELY, HALF OF ALL MEN DIAGNOSED WITH TESTICULAR CANCER DO NOT SEEK MEDICAL ATTENTION UNTIL AFTER THE CANCER HAS SPREAD TO OTHER AREAS OF THE BODY. BE SURE TO REACH OUT AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. REMEMBER, WE ARE HERE TO HELP.
